Executive Summary

- 1. The Commissioner has received indication of funding of £1,619,189.22 from the Ministry of Justice for victims services in 2016-2017;
- 2. Lancashire Victim Services has been established to provide a range of services and support for victims of crime in Lancashire in line with the statutory requirement of Police and Crime Commissioners and in support of the Commissioner's Priorities
- 3. This Decision seeks to approve the continuation of a Lancashire based solution for the provision of victims' services and to approve the option to extend the contract with Victim Support (as a sole supplier) for a further 12 month. All the terms and conditions of the Contract remain the same.
- 4. Victim Support have indicated that, following an internal restructure, they are able to provide the 12 month extension to the Contract with a 6.3% reduction in cost

Recommendation

That the Commissioner approve:

- 1. The continuation of a Lancashire based model for the delivery of victim services in 2016/17
- 2. That the Contract with Victim Support is extended in line with the option provided in the original Decision for Victim Support to provide victim services in Lancashire (Decision 2015/73)

Victim Support have been subject to quarterly performance reviews which have demonstrated their ability to deliver against the agreed Contract. Formal quarterly performance reviews will continue in 2016/17.

Lancashire Victim Services continues to develop with further additional specialist services starting delivery in 2016/17. The extension of the contract with Victim Support provides a consistent delivery of the core victim services while specialist services are developed and embedded.

This proposal seeks to continue the established Lancashire Victim Services approach for a further 12 month period.

- 1. The anticipated cost of the provision of services under the 12 month extension to the original contract agreed with Victim Support is £659,164.00
