TITLE: COMBINATION AGREEMENT – PENNINE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

REPORT BY: ROBERT RUSTON - VICTIMS, COMMISSIONING AND PARTNERSHIPS MANAGER

Executive Summary:

- 1. Under Schedule 11 (Section 5A) of the Police Reform & Social Responsibility Act 2011 the Police and Crime Commissioner has the responsibility to approve a Combination Agreement between two or more Community Safety Partnerships (CSP)
- Blackburn with Darwen CSP, Burnley CSP and Rossendale CSP are seeking to enter into a combination agreement to integrate the roles, responsibilities and functions of a joint crime and disorder committee, formalising the current arrangements operating under the Pennine Community Safety Strategic Group.
- 3. To approve a Combination Agreement the Commissioner will need to be satisfied that the Combination Agreement evidences that it would be in the interest of one or more of the following to do so
 - (a) reducing crime and disorder
 - (b) reducing re-offending
 - (c) combating the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances
 - and that all responsible authorities in relation to the area are party to the agreement.
- 4. The Combined CSP would be known as the 'Pennine Lancashire Community Safety Partnership' and is currently chaired by Dr Christopher Clayton, Clinical Chief Officer Blackburn with Darwen Clinical Commissioning Group
- 5. That the Commissioner acknowledges that, whilst represented on the Pennine Community Safety Strategic Group, Hyndburn and Pendle Districts have chosen to retain their own Community Safety Partnerships.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Commissioner:

- Approves the Combination Agreement to establish a Combined Community Safety
 Partnership for Blackburn with Darwen, Burnley and Rossendale Council areas, to be
 known as the Pennine Lancashire Community Safety Partnership.
 A copy of the Combination Agreement is attached at Appendix B
- 2. Continues to provide support to all Community Safety Partnerships in the Pennine Lancashire area, and where possible, will be represented by his office at meetings of the CSPs.

COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIPS COMBINATION AGREEMENT

BACKGROUND:

Under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 Act the Police and Crime Commissioner may make a combination agreement in relation two or more local authority areas.

A combination agreement is an agreement for the functions conferred under section 6 or section 7 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to be carried out in relation to the combined area as if it was a single local authority area. This will include the requirement to produce a plan and undertake the required public consultation in relation to this, and to call a Domestic Homicide Review when required.

All the responsible authorities in relation to the combined area must agree to the combination agreement before the Police and Crime Commissioner may make the agreement.

PROCESS:

To enable the Commissioner to consider the making of a combination agreement the following process has been established by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC):

- An initial letter of intent to enter into a combination agreement, signed on behalf of all the relevant responsible authorities, is submitted to the OPCC. For each Local Authority, this should include a signature from the Leader of the Council as well as the Chief Executive or another nominated senior officer.
- 2. The OPCC will send a Combination Agreement Pro Forma to be completed and signed by all the relevant responsible authorities.
- 3. The relevant responsible authorities must submit evidence to the Commissioner to demonstrate that a combination agreement will support and enhance the delivery of one or more of the following:
 - Reducing crime and disorder
 - Reducing re-offending
 - Combating the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances Partners may wish to include an evidence base drawn from local crime performance data, re-offending data and details of local engagement plans.



- 4. In considering the request to make a Combination Agreement the Commissioner will also take into account a range of additional factors such as:
 - How the combined partnerships will retain local sensitivity, consult with and be accountable to local residents. For example will the combined partnership develop a community engagement strategy?
 - How will scrutiny of the combined partnership be undertaken. For example, will this be through each local authority or will a joint scrutiny committee be established?
- On consideration of the evidence the Commissioner will notify the relevant responsible authorities whether he is minded to make a Combination Agreement.
- 6. If the Commissioner is minded to make the combination agreement, then the OPCC will draft an Agreement for signature by all the relevant responsible authorities.

There are clear benefits to the area operating a combined Community Safety Partnership between Blackburn with Darwen Rossendale and Burnley. These include: Legal mandate to work collaboratively on an all-encompassing crime and disorder plan and hold partner agencies to account. Provides opportunities to work with commissioned services such as Inspire and CRC's within common geographical areas of responsibility to enable more effective and consistent approaches to be developed to reduce crime and disorder. There are improved opportunities for economies of scale, reduced duplication and consistent resource investment from larger partner organisations. Opportunity to make better use of resources i.e. in developing policy and strategy. The influence the group has is enhanced through collaborative bargaining power both at a regional and national level.



- A CSP at a Pennine level will allow local delivery structures to focus on tactical community concerns and respond more flexibly separating out strategic engagement with partner organisations from the operational.
 - Opportunity for Elected Members to engage with and influence strategic partners agencies and service providers.
 - The Constabulary, Community
 Rehabilitation Company, National
 Probation Service, Clinical
 Commissioning Group (East) and Fire
 Service have limited ability to engage
 with very localised community safety
 arrangements beyond this financial
 year. Authorities need to recognise that
 and adapt accordingly to avoid strategic
 engagement at a statutory minimum

Each local authority will retain existing arrangements around community engagement for example ward solutions meetings, PACT meetings, community and service user forums. These will be used to drive both local community safety tactical activity and feed in to strategic decision making where concerns are raised that are consistent across the sub-region and require a strategic collaborative response.
